IBIZA, IBIZA TOWN

Ibiza owns a reputation as a boisterous party town
 where hit the beaches by day and dance all night.
 But this is only part of the story for this picturesque
 island, which is part of Balearics near the coast of
 Spain.

The town was founded by the Carthaginians around
 the sixth century B.C. and ruled in turn by the Ro-
 mans, Arabs and Catalans. Evidence of these peri-
 ods can be seen in the Dalt Vila, or old town, which
 boasts many historical structures and relics and two
 notable museums. The medieval walled city and its
 Gothic cathedral became a UNESCO World Heri-
 tage site in 1999.

During the day, Ibiza is an ideal place to explore,
 with trendy shops, interesting restaurants and a
 growing number of luxury hotels and spas in its
 beautiful harbour. In addition, the island boasts 56
 sandy beaches around its coastline, making it the
 perfect place to simply relax.

PALMA, BALEARIC ISLANDS, SPAIN

Valldemosa & Palma Cathedral

By air-conditioned motor coach

Minimum 20 participants, no maximum.

Duration: 4h30

Euros 52

From the port we start with a drive to the Cathedral passing by the Paseo Maritimo with numerous hotels lining one side and luxury yachts on the other. You will visit the interior of Spain's second largest Gothic Cathedral, built more than 500 years ago. Its tall, slender columns and graceful interior arches create a lasting impression. You will also walk through the small Treasure Museum, which displays ancient manuscripts, paintings and religious items. There are 80 steps up to the Cathedral.

After this visit, we'll drive to Valldemossa, one of the most beautiful and typical villages on the island, nestled in a valley in the northern mountain range. Enjoy the beauty that Majorca has to offer, with mountains and coastline scenery. We will drive you along the rugged northern coast, seeing landscapes of pine forest and groves of almond and olive trees.

You'll visit the Carthusian Monastery with a guide. You will see the Small neo-classical church, which is known for its lovely frescoes painted by Goya's brother-in-law. Also, it features an intricately carved choir stall and rich tapestries. The 18th century pharmacy is set up almost exactly as it was by the monks in 1723. The town owes much of its fame to the fact that the famous musician and composer, Frederic Chopin, and his lover, writer, George Sand, spent their winter of discontent in 1838 and added their note of romanticism to Majorcan history. During the visit to the Carthusian Monastery you will see Chopin's piano, the beautiful garden and enjoy the views. Afterwards, you will have some leisure time to stroll amongst the souvenir shops.

Palma by Bike

Minimum 8 participants, maximum 16

Duration: 3h30/4h

Euros 69

Indulge your senses with the fresh air, great outdoors and scenic beauty of Palma during this memorable bicycle tour through the historic Old Town.

Once ashore, meet your guide, receive your safety briefing, bicycle and helmet, then follow the dedicated bicycle lane along the bay and into the city. Your route proceeds for approximately 100 yards (about 91 metres) on top of the old city wall before entering the small and shady alleyways of the Old Town.

En route, discover churches, small monasteries and old aristocrat's mansions featuring cosy patios and enchanting small plazas. Along the way, your guide offers interesting commentary about your surroundings, and points out interesting sights. Halfway through the ride, a refreshment stop is made at a local tavern before continuing on your bicycle tour, which concludes back at the pier.

- The total route travelled is six-eight miles (10-12 kilometres) over mostly flat surfaces.
- This tour is not recommended for guests with limited mobility.
- All equipment is provided.



MINORCA, PORT MAHON

The island of Menorca received the official title of Biosphere Reserve (Man and Biosphere project – MAB, UNESCO) in 1993. The MAB Program, which means Man and Biosphere, was created in 1971. It is a scientific program for problems related to the use and preservation of natural resources in all kinds of biological and geographical situations. One of the main objectives of this program is to preserve natural places and their genetic material.

BONIFACIO, CORSICA

Isolated on the southernmost point of Corsica, majestic Bonifacio's natural surroundings are nothing less than remarkable. Sheer, white limestone cliffs rise out of the sea, forming a perfect natural harbour as well as a picturesque setting for this unique town. The first historical mention of Bonifacio is actually in Homer's *Odyssey*: "An excellent harbour, closed in on all sides by an unbroken ring of precipitous cliffs, with two bold headlands facing each other at the mouth so as to leave only a narrow channel in between." Homer's was an accurate description of Bonifacio. In Roman times, Bonifacio was only a small village. It began to develop around 828 AD when Count Bonifacio of Tuscany built a castle on the peninsula. Its superior location made many European powers desire possession of the port, and like some of its Corsican counterparts, it was also subject to numerous raids and attacks. The predominant forces were the Genoese who held domain from the 12th to the 19th century until Corsica was returned to France. For the last 100 years Bonifacio was a sleepy town of fishermen, until the arrival of tourism. Today, you will find Bonifacio to be an exciting destination possessing a variety of old and new-world charm and breath-taking beauty.

CALVI

Sant'Antonino & Pigna Authentic Corsican Villages
 By air conditioned motor coach and on foot
 Minimum 20 participants, maximum 44
 Duration: 3 hours
 Euros 58

This excursion is the perfect way to enjoy one of Corsica's main attractions: its ruggedly beautiful scenery; winding roads will take you from one picturesque village to another.

The ancient circular village of Sant'Antonino, perched on a craggy rock overlooking the sea, is one of the oldest inhabited villages in Corsica and one of the highest. It is visible from miles around and offers superb 360° panoramic views. In the 9th century it was ruled by the Counts of Savelli who built the now-ruined castle in order to defend their clan. The narrow cobbled lanes, vaulted alleyways and neat stone houses have survived the passage of time and have changed very little over the past three hundred years. Sant'Antonino features in the list of "the most beautiful villages of France" and is highly prized by visitors for its spectacular views.

After a short visit of Sant' Antonino you will be driven to the hill top village of Pigna.

This delightful village in the heart of the Balagne region is built on a rocky promontory 224 m above sea level, situated at the foot of a mountain some 562m high. It is a veritable feast for the eyes with flower decked streets and an attractive village square. Pigna is dedicated to the pursuit of arts and crafts and a community of artists has settled there. It is the ideal place to buy some authentic Corsican souvenirs, made on site and sometimes before your very eyes.

You will spend some time in the village and then the coach will take you back to Calvi via the charming old villages of Corbara and Aregno.

- Due to restricted access the coach will park below Sant' Antonino. The walk to the village is uphill over uneven and rough ground. Good shoes are a must.

- Corsican roads are winding, so this is not the ideal tour for guests suffering from vertigo or car sickness.
- During the summer months heavy traffic can be expected, which may cause delays.
- This tour involves a lot of driving. You will spend approximately 45 minutes in each village.



PORTOFINO

Trekking from San Fruttuoso

Minimum 15 participants, maximum 30

Euros 44

This excursion is suitable for experienced hikers

You will take the tender boat to Portofino pier where your guide will be waiting, before hopping on to the public ferry service to San Fruttuoso. During the trip your guide will tell you a bit about the area and the natural environment while you enjoy stunning views of the promontory.

San Fruttuoso, also known as San Fruttuoso di Camogli is a little jewel situated on a pristine bay between Portofino and Camogli. While scarcely more than a blip on the mountainous coastline, San Fruttuoso boasts a Benedictine monastery situated right on the beach and accessible only by foot or by sea. This fine 10th century abbey is dedicated to Saint Fruttuoso, a Catalan bishop martyred by the Roman emperor Valerian and burned at the stake. According to tradition Saint Fruttuoso appeared in a dream to five monks and told them where to bury his mortal remains and to this day his ashes are kept inside the church as a precious relic. The other attraction of San Fruttuoso, apart from the spectacular views and limpid blue sea, is the statue of "Christ of the Abyss". A wonderful bronze statue of Jesus Christ, arms outstretched in blessing. The statue was submerged in the Mediterranean Sea at a depth of 56ft (17 m) near the spot where Dario Gonzatti, the first Italian to use SCUBA gear, died in a diving accident in 1947. It has become a place of pilgrimage for divers from all over the world.

Before starting on the trek, you will have time to admire the abbey (from the outside) and will learn about the history of the village and its monastery.

The trek route goes through the National park, a nature conservation area. A dirt track climbs up the promontory through a shady forest of Holm oaks. At a height of approximately 250m the trail levels off of-

fering fantastic views of the plunging cliffs and deep blue Mediterranean Sea. The vegetation is a mixture of evergreen Mediterranean shrubs and bushes and aromatic herbs. Flanking the southern slope of the promontory, the level trail ends just above Portofino. Don't forget your cameras because the trek offers some spectacular photo opportunities. The descent to Portofino is paved and overlooks the east side of the promontory and the beautiful Gulf of Tigullio.

- The ferry boat ride takes 30 minutes.
- The hike from San Fruttuoso to Portofino takes 2h30 but depends on the group's pace.
- The hike includes a number of steep ascents and descents.
- The start of the trail is very steep : from sea level to 250m in 40 minutes.
- Hiking shoes recommended as the ground is uneven.
- The tour is subject to weather conditions.



Kayak Tour of Portofino**Difficulty medium****Minimum 6 participants, maximum 25****Duration: 2h30****Euros 66**

Our kayak tour is surely the best, most ecologically sound way of exploring the beauties of the Portofino promontory and the protected marine nature reserve. During the tour you will be accompanied by a kayak instructor and eco tour guide. The excursion starts with a 20 minute stroll along a path on the promontory which leads to sandy Niasca beach. Here you will start your kayak exploration of Portofino (1h30). Glide along one of the world's most beautiful coastlines and admire the craggy cliffs and limpid blue waters as you paddle your way to Portofino lighthouse. The scenery is breathtaking and there will be an opportunity to go swimming.

- After a tender boat ride to the shore, you will walk to the end of Portofino village and follow a path along the promontory which leads down below the Hotel Splendido. The walk takes 20 minutes.
- You will be provided with all necessary equipment including water and a snack.
- Please bring sea shoes, sun glasses, sunscreen, hat and towel.
- Wear your bathing suit.
- Kayaking does not require any technical knowledge just some pleasant physical exercise.
- There is a 20 minute (approximately) walk each way and 1h30 kayaking.

ILE ROUSSE

Ile Rousse (L'isula Rossa in the Corsican language) is a little town in Upper Corsica in the Balagne region to the north west of the island, some 25 km from Calvi. It is popular with visitors but still retains its local character. Place Paoli at the centre of town is a shady square bordered by tall plane trees and outdoor cafés. It is a lively spot and a great favourite with locals who gather there to play pétanque (French bowls).

The old town with its traditional grid street system is also very worth a visit.

The Pietra peninsula, linked to the town by a jetty, affords fine views of the neighbouring islands, the port area, Ile Rousse and the Balagne hills. Climb up to the lighthouse to enjoy a really splendid panorama.



CALVI

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PORQUEROLLES, ILES D'HYERES

Porquerolles and Port Cros are two beautiful wooded islands situated just off the coast, near Toulon and Hyères, not far from Saint Tropez. Despite their proximity to the French Riviera they are far removed from the mass tourism of the mainland. They mainly function as a nature reserve, with Port Cros being the first sea park in Europe. Here there are no built up holiday resorts, or cars and even smoking is forbidden outside the village so as not to endanger the forest. Porquerolles is a mountain biker's paradise. You can hire a bike and cycle all around the island in the shade of its magnificent Mediterranean forest. With a little bit of effort you will discover secluded crowd free beaches such as Notre Dame in the north east corner of the island, a 20 minutes bike trip from the village. After another 20 minutes cycling you will reach the Cape of Medes and be rewarded with stunning views of the island, the coast, Bagoud, Port Cros and Levant. Silver Beach is also very fine, but often rather crowded

SANARY SUR MER

Sanary Sur Mer is a small fishing village located on the coast of southern France between Marseille and Toulon. Among its attractions is a 13th century watchtower which now houses the Frédéric Dumas diving museum. Frédéric Dumas (1913-1991) worked closely with Jacques Cousteau, and starred in many of his underwater documentary films. Places of interest nearby include the Castellet racing circuit, Porquerolles, Port Cros, the medieval village of Le Castellet, the Gorges du Verdon and the wine circuit of Bandol.



SAINT TROPEZ

Up until 1958 Saint Tropez was just a sleepy, picturesque fishing village; then the legendary couple Brigitte Bardot and Roger Vadim arrived, bringing with them a touch of glamour and changing the place beyond all recognition.

However the history of St Tropez goes way back, well before the era of movie stars, luxury yachts and glamour girls in bikinis. It was once a place of Christian pilgrimage, honouring the martyrdom of a young Roman soldier named Tropes. Tropes openly professed his Christian beliefs and was beheaded by the authorities and cast adrift in a small boat which eventually washed ashore at the place now known as St Tropez.

In the 1800's St Tropez became a centre for art and culture with the arrival of the French writer Guy de Maupassant and the Impressionist painter Paul Signac who brought with them a host of talented contemporaries, including Matisse.

Today St Tropez is famous the world over for being one of the most glamorous locations on the French Riviera. While it is mostly known for its beaches and port filled with millionaire's yachts, it also boasts tree lined squares, pastel coloured houses, chic boutiques and quaint cafés serving a delicious local pastry the "Tarte Tropezienne".

Fruit of the Vine Tour

St Tropez and the French Riviera immediately conjure up images of glamorous starlets, yachts and fashionable hot spots, but there is much more to it than that, as our wine expert guide will show you.

St Tropez was, and still is if you know where to look, an authentic Provençal village with a rich cultural heritage. Eva our knowledgeable wine expert is a member of many prestigious Wine Brotherhoods: "Les Compagnons du Beaujolais", "les Chevaliers Rabelaisiens" and "les Chevaliers de la Méduse", so she is ideally suited to leading you on a voyage of discovery under the auspices of Bacchus, as well as showing you the architectural treasures of St Tropez. The wine tasting will take place in a local wine bar where you will learn about the history, grape varieties and production of local wines and the determining influence of the Mediterranean Sea. You will also have the pleasure of putting theoretical knowledge into practice with a comprehensive tasting of red, white and rosé wines accompanied by cheese and snacks.

MONACO

The Principality of Monaco, tucked between the French and Italian borders, covers just 1.1 square miles. This independent sovereign state is headed by Prince Albert II who is descended from the Grimaldi dynasty which has ruled Monaco since 1297. The principality is synonymous with the High Life: glamorous celebrities, Formula One racing and Casinos. Monte Carlo is the most famous area, but in reality Monaco is divided into four sections: Monaco Ville, the old section of town which includes the Prince's palace, the Condamine, which is the port area and Fontvieille, a man-made water front district.

Monaco has some of the finest examples of Belle Epoque building, an architectural style which began during the rule of the Emperor Napoleon III.

Beautiful natural surroundings, sunny climate, a yacht filled harbour, casino, designer boutiques, prestigious events and gala parties, Monaco can truly be said to have it all.

A heady atmosphere of glamour and excitement permeates the Principality, captivating all who visit this storybook land of princes and princesses.

CANNES

Scenic Transfer to Nice Airport

(ends at Nice airport)

Transport by air conditioned minibus

Unaccompanied transfer with an English speaking driver

You will drive straight on to St Paul de Vence, a few kilometres past Cannes. This authentic medieval fortified village was built on a hill top so as to avoid Saracen attacks. In the 1920's it was discovered by artists such as Bonnard, Modigliani, Signac and Soutine, and since that time it has attracted a good number of the rich and famous literati and glitterati.

You will have approximately one hour at leisure to go round the village before driving to the airport. Stroll down Rue Grande, the main street which runs right through the village and explore the XVI^o century ramparts which afford spectacular views over mimosas, olive and orange groves.

- Your luggage will go with you in the minibus.

Visit Grasse the world's perfume capital

Transport by air-conditioned minibus

Unaccompanied visit of a perfume factory

Transfer with an English speaking driver – no guide.

Ever since the 17th century Grasse has been enveloped in a heady cloud of perfume; today the town is the universally acknowledged perfume capital of the world.

After a 45 minute drive you will arrive in Grasse where you can visit the prestigious Gallimard factory and be initiated into the art of traditional perfume making. Follow each step from the assembling of raw materials to the final precious elixir, piercing the mysteries of distillation and enfleurage on the way. You will visit the laboratory and the conditioning room where you will learn about the origin of perfume. You will also discover the “seat of power”, the work place of the indispensable “Nose”. This olfactory genius is a Maestro who plays his perfume organ with incredible virtuosity, composing fragrances of unsurpassed subtlety and charm. Some “insider” secrets will be revealed before its time to visit the gift shop to do some last minute shopping before flying back home. (not a guided visit)

If you don't feel like visiting the factory you can set off on your own to discover this fascinating town. The Place aux Aires at the heart of Grasse is a good starting point. This charming square with its ochre façades, arcades and four tiered fountain dating from Louis XV's time is always bustling with activity, and boasts many interesting shops, outdoor cafés and restaurants. The Old town is a maze of narrow winding streets, alleys and stairways with buildings from the Middle ages and the Renaissance. Discover the traces of the city's past as you admire a square Saracen tower, the remains of the 16th century ramparts, and the town hall, formerly the bishop's palace. You

will see medieval dwellings and superb private mansions (the Hôtel de Cabris, the Hôtel de Ponteves and the Court de Fontmichel) as well as elegant 18th century villas; not forgetting the wonderful Belle Epoque casino, which is now a conference centre.

- The drive to Grasse takes 45 minutes.
- The drive to the airport takes 45 minutes.
